




- 1. Each container (A P) show a sample of substances as viewed at the atomic level. Characterize the contents of any FIVE (not Container A) of the containers in terms of each of the following categories:
  - Category I. Homogeneous mixture, heterogeneous mixture, or pure substance Category II. Element(s), compound(s) or both

  - Category III. Solid, liquid, gas or combination of phases

As an example consider Container A. Category I: pure substance; Category II: element; Category III: gas phase. It is a pure substance since there is a single type of matter in the container. It is an element since it exists as a monoatomic substance. Finally it is in the gas phase due to the totally random distribution of particles.





